
In between the bursts on the wiring Rob has been patiently working at the base for the scenery. Thanks Rob.

You will note that there are members personal layouts in there and we would like to add yours.


Again, don't be shy. It can only help yourself and also others as they get new ideas.

The Bush tramways Glen Afton line is a treat for old and young. On Sunday 2nd October a group including (one brave wife) from the club made the trip over the Huntly bridge to Pukemiro. Unusually it spent its entire working life trundling backwards and forwards on the colliery line. It hs a copper firebox and brass tubes hence its long life – very cool.


On return Mike had a sausage – morning tea?


